

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#### A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR EDELEN



The City of Del Rey Oaks is at a key crossroad in its development. On the positive side, the City currently has a lean, professional staff and city government, a balanced budget, and the best cooperative working environment in decades. Our city is also in better financial shape than most of the cities in Monterey

County. However, we do face several challenges on the immediate horizon:

First, we have to complete the process of severing all ties with our former developer. It has taken 2 ½ years in a long series of court battles; but, we've finally prevailed in our law suit against him; only to have him declare bankruptcy and move disposition of the case to Federal Court. I'm confident our city will prevail; but, the time it is taking to go through the legal process is delaying our potential development and subsequent revenue stream to our city.

Second, due to the excellent ideas for development a lot of our residents have submitted, we are anxiously anticipating breaking ground on a low density, environmentally friendly project on our Fort Ord acreage that will provide badly needed funds to further improve our city. Our infrastructure such as sewer lines and roads are aging; our park needs upgrading; power lines should be put underground; and installing sidewalks with decorative street lamps would greatly enhance the appearance of our city. In addition, building a "true" downtown Del Rey Oaks complete with lighted walking trails to this destination would significantly improve our quality of life and further tie our city together.

Unfortunately, there are extreme, no-compromise, no-growth organizations that do not want any development, whatsoever, on the former Fort Ord. Right now, these groups are threatening Seaside, Monterey County and the Veteran's Cemetery; but, a recent conversation I had with a friend who is on the inside of one of these groups tells me that their ultimate goal is to stop all Fort Ord development, including our planned Del Rey Oaks development. In other words, these groups threaten the future financial viability of our city and they cannot be allowed to succeed. If you read a news article about our Fort Ord property, you can be pretty much assured that the article is based in truth. However, if you read Letters to the Editor, please do not accept the allegations in the letters as factual. A lot of these letters are designed to mislead the public as to the truth as to what is occurring on the former Fort Ord. If you have any questions about what is actually occurring, please come to City Hall before our monthly City Council meeting and speak with me directly (I'm always there early), or contact me via City Hall and I'll get back to you.

This year, I was elected Chair of both the Fort Ord Reuse Authority, and the Transportation Agency for Monterey County. As Chair of both of these key Monterey County organizations, I should be able to substantially assist our city to achieve its goals.

As always, it is an honor for me to serve as your Mayor and to continue to try to improve the city that we all love.

## A Message from your City Manager Daniel Dawson

I have really grown to love this small city and the wonderful residents who call this home during the almost 4 years that I have been your City Manager!

The challenges faced by Cities and the State in the toughest economic times since the great depression have made it challenging to provide the level of services you have grown to expect from your City staff but we continue to shave costs while looking for revenue streams that will enable us to provide the services that you deserve!

### Del Rey Oaks: It Became a City To Dodge Annexation Thrusts

(Article transcribed from original for copy clarity)

**DEL REY OAKS** — Three years ago, the tiny community of Del Rey Oaks found itself cast in the role of a mouse which is flanked by a cat and an owl, both hungry.

On May 26, 1953 — weary of fighting annexation attempts by Monterey and loath to become a part of the soon-to-be-incorporated City of Seaside — Del Rey Oaks took a big jump.

With much wrangling and amid dire predictions that it was a waste of time, money and effort, a group of citizens launched a move to incorporate the town.

After months of mass meetings, public hearings where many talked and few listened, claims and counterclaims, petitions and counter-petitions — and a last-ditch attempt to annex to Monterey by some partisans —incorporation was voted in an elections held August 25, 1953.

There were 386 registered voters qualified for the election, and 317 of them went to the polls. When the ballots were counted, incorporation had carried, 169 to 134, and a five-man City Council had been elected. And in the intervening 33 months, Del Rey Oaks has done right well for itself. The same five men — Mayor Jim Doan, Charles W. Benson, Sam DeMello, Dennis Kavanaugh and James W. Wilson — are still

land-styled City Hall and handle the official business of the town which is unique in many ways.

For one thing, it has a tax rate of only 50 cents — low enough to raise eyebrows in municipal government circles.

For another, it has money in the till, enough to keep two full-time paid employees and three part-time workers on the payroll.

Because it lies within the Seaside Sanitation District and Seaside Fire District, there is no problem with sewage disposal or firefighting apparatus.

Every street in the City has curbs—and all are better paved than most of those in Monterey or Seaside.

The city has its own police force, park department, sanitation crew and street department. All four are run by the same man, Al Schmeltz, who is equally at ease behind the wheel of the green-and-white police car or the packer-type garbage truck.

It is the only city in the County of Monterey without a cent of sales tax revenue — for one excellent reason. There is not one commercial establishment in town. Only three lots, all on Fremont Extension and so far undeveloped, are zoned for commercial use.

Thus it is an entirely Residential town, one with better-class homes perched on the gently sloping north wall of Del Rey Canyon, overlooking the heavy-forested park on the opposite side which was donated to the city by T. A. Work of Monterey.

City Hall — once a plain frame building owned by the navy and now dolled up in trim green and white and sporting a massive fireplace, is at the bottom of the canyon.

Nearby is a playground which would serve a city of much larger population well. It as built almost entirely with the donated labor of Del Rey Oaks citizens, who number about 1,500 in all.

Perhaps 25 per cent of the families are those of servicemen from Fort Ord, the Presidio or the Naval Postgraduate School. A high percentage are professional people.

Among the latter is Don Smith, who was Soledad City Attorney when the incorporation proponents brought him in to handle legal matters. He liked the town so well he stayed on as city attorney.

All this was not easily come by. When Sam DeMello launched the campaign for incorporation at a meeting of the Del Rey Property Owners Assn. just three years ago, tempers flared frequently.

After three hours of hot discussion, a secret ballot was taken. It showed 128 in favor of incorporation and 30 dissenting, favoring either joining Monterey or remaining within the then-proposed Seaside city boundary.

DeMello spoke eloquently of the high Monterey tax rate and the \$50,000 deficit which that city then faced, and of the numerous and noisy

difficulties which had attended Seaside incorporation moves.

Circulation of petitions to call an election started immediately.

Immediately the pro-Monterey forces started drafting petitions of their own calling for annexation.

A legal horserace developed, which the incorporation group won handily, getting their petitions to the Board of Supervisors and thus nullifying the Monterey enthusiasts.

Election day gave voters a chance to vote on the incorporation itself and choose its council from a slate of nine candidates.

Two, Richard C. Campbell and Eugene E. Drucker, were outspoken foes of the incorporation. Campbell missed being elected to the first council by only five votes, and also lost out in a subsequent election.

The other two candidates on the first ballot were John J. Mahoney and William Reinhard.

Actual date of incorporation was not until Sept. 3, 1953, when the canvass of votes was filed with the Secretary of State.

That evening, the new councilmen and city officials held their first meeting, sitting at a table composed of paper-covered boards laid across two sawhorses in the William

Pachetti garage.

The first ordinance passed established the uniform building, electrical and plumbing codes, established zoning, a planning commission and assorted other civic necessities.

There was municipal rejoining when the fledgling city wound up its first fiscal year with a net balance of \$4,300.

There was hardly anything said by the people who said it wouldn't work in the first place.

## Local Police Department's Anonymous Gun Buy Back Program a Success



Your Monterey Peninsula law enforcement agencies (California Highway Patrol, California State University Monterey Bay Police Department, Carmel By-The-Sea Police Department, Del Rey Oaks Police Department, Marina Police Department, Monterey County Sheriff's Office, Monterey Police Department, Pacific Grove Police Department, Sand City Police Department, and the Seaside Police Department) completed their first Monterey Peninsula Anonymous Gun Buy Back program.

The gun buy back event was held on Saturday, April 6, 2013, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Roberts Lake, at the corner of Roberts Avenue & Canyon Del Rey in Seaside, California.

The event raised \$25,300. \$100 cash was paid for each gun turned in, limited to three (regardless of the number of firearms surrendered). The funds were totally disbursed within the first two hours of the event. A total of 319 guns were surrendered, 66 without a cash payment, consisting of:

131 Handguns 186 Rifles/Shotguns and sawed off shotguns

1 Assault Rifle

1 Sub-Machine gun

There is an RV parked on the street and it never moves!

The Del Rey Oaks

Municipal Code states in part:

No person who owns or has possession, custody or control of any vehicle shall park such vehicle upon any street or alley for more than a consecutive period of seventy-two (72) hours and RV's may only park on improved driveways.

My neighbor's dog never stops barking! It's waking me up and I have to work in the morning!



The Del Rey Oaks Municipal Code states in part:

It is unlawful to keep any dog which by reason of its barking, howling, yelping or other noise habitually disturbs the peace any person!

There is construction going on down the block, did they get a permit?

Call City Hall (394-8511) to find out if you need a permit <u>before</u> you begin any construction or repairs!

These permits are issued for your protection! A permit issued to a contractor ensures that they are licensed and carry the required insurance to protect you and your home. An inspector checks their work throughout construction to ensure it's built correctly.

Why are my neighbor's garbage cans out for a week?



The Del Rey Oaks

Municipal Code states in part:

It is unlawful for any persons to allow garbage or refuse container(s) to remain at the curb for a longer period of time than twenty-four (24) hours prior to the date of collection, or for a longer period of time than twenty-four (24) hours after collection.

Did my neighbor get permission to cut down/trim that tree?



The Del Rey Oaks Municipal Code states in part:

Any person desiring to remove, cut down, destroy, alter, relocate, prune and/or trim, or otherwise undertake activities which could inflict damage to an oak or other significant tree, shall first obtain a tree permit from the City. (\$25)

Can I put concrete or a metal grate at the bottom of my driveway?



The Del Rey Oaks Municipal Code states in part:

All driveway approaches shall not obstruct or endanger the normal and customary pedestrian and vehicular traffic and the normal flow of water. They are very dangerous for kids on bicycles. City Hall offers simple plans to correct your driveway approach with your concrete contractor.

# Storm Water Concerns



The City of Del Rey Oaks is a permitted member of the Monterey Regional Storm Water Management Program (MRSWMP).

One of the regional storm water permit program responsibilities is to properly manage urban runoff and storm water that drains into the Monterey Bay via the storm drain system, and to prevent pollutants entering the storm drain system (oil, carpet cleaning wastewater, auto detailing soaps and rinse water, restaurant mat and trash area wash down, pesticides/fertilizers from landscapes, etc).

ALL storm drains flow <u>directly</u> to either the Monterey Bay or other water bodies throughout the area; they do not go through a treatment process prior to draining to the sea water bodies. <u>Only rain should go into storm drains</u>.


Del Rey Oaks is also responsible for implementation of the City's annual storm water program, with assistance from our regional program manager, and compliance with the State's storm water regulations utilizing best management practices (BMPs) to meet measureable goals outlined in our adopted storm water plan.

You as our residents have a crucial role in our Storm Water Program. These include:

- Report any foreign liquids or solids you see in the City gutters or streets, or entering the storm drain system to the Police Department at 831-375-8525. Some examples would be paint, fuel, concrete wash off, sewage & debris, including litter, etc. Also report anyone you see dumping fluids or sweeping lawn debris/leaves into storm drains.
- If you see any liquid coming out of a manhole, report it immediately to the Police Department.
- Please keep the gutter in front of your home free of leaves, pine needles and other

debris, minimize the usage of pesticides or fertilizers, and minimize lawn irrigation to prevent runoff and water waste.

- Do not change the oil or other fluids of your vehicle in the street and ensure your car does not leak oil onto the street (if parked on the street)
- Move your vehicle out of the street on street sweeping days (Usually the first Wednesday of each Month).
